



We are a large family and the need is growing. That's why we need to work together as partners in the body of Christ. Our brothers and sisters need our support to stand strong and serve their communities. They need to know they are not forgotten.



By praying regularly, supporting practically, and speaking up powerfully for the rights of our persecuted brothers and sisters, you can provide your persecuted brothers and sisters with the spiritual encouragement and practical support that they need.



And there are huge benefits for your church, too. Having a relationship with persecuted Christians will inspire you to grow in faith, prayer and love.

In response to the wave of refugees fleeing so-called Islamic State, the courtyard of this church in Iraq is now home to 700 Iraqi families.



Church leader Douglas says, "It is an honour to help and to serve them."

Through different partners and organisations, we are currently helping more than 14,000 displaced families with food, hygiene and medical supplies.

Thousands of Bibles are being placed into the hands of people who are hungry for hope. Broken hearts are being ministered to through prayer in Jesus' name. And children are being given an opportunity to have fun again.





## "We are ambassadors for the Lord"

Although in many areas of the world Christians find themselves excluded and in a minority, this doesn't mean that they give up in despair. The persecuted church is a proactive church – not a passive church – praying fervently, reaching out to others and witnessing to the love of Christ.

Open Doors partners with a number of churches and organisations to bring relief to displaced families in Syria, including this church in Damascus. Edward, their church leader, says:

"We pray every morning that the Lord will give us the opportunity to help others and to be a blessing for others...

"We thank the Lord that He is working through the hearts of people. In the West and everywhere, people are supporting and enabling the church to give this message of love to our communities and our people."

### How can your church stand with our persecuted family?

- By **praying**, regularly, as a whole church for the needs of persecuted Christians
- By engaging with emergency appeals and advocacy campaigns launched in response to urgent need
- By **dedicating** a Sunday service to the persecuted church, at least once a year
- By appointing a member of the church leadership, or another key person, with whom we can regularly communicate
- By **encouraging** every member to go deeper and pray as often as they can for the persecuted church.

#### We'll do everything we can to support you:


- **By sending** a monthly email to church leaders with up-todate news and prayer requests from the persecuted church
- **By giving** information on the latest emergency appeals and advocacy campaigns
- **By inviting** church leaders to meet persecuted Christians at confidential briefings, overseas trips and an annual retreat
- **By offering** a local speaker to give a presentation to your church, should you request it
- By providing you with inspiring resources to help your church engage with the needs of persecuted Christians throughout the year.

served 356,000 people through community development projects.


